- agreed upon by the Minister's Council 45 revenue options were reviewed using 9 different economic measures
- Options were further narrowed down to 25 and an additional 6 options were added

Implications Table

- Identifies possible pieces of legislation that would need changing
- Acknowledges concern of tax increase vs. provincial revenue decreases
- Notes administrative options or concerns (provincial vs. local collection) → Not a cost/benefit analysis

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Addressing the Infrastructure Deficit & Service Funding Imbalance

Issues to consider

- Service funding imbalance includes areas of joint provincial/municipal responsibility(e.g. EMS, Police, FCSS) that require additional funding from the province.
- The infrastructure deficit will be different for each municipality
- New revenues sources may have different potential yields for each municipality. Therefore, municipalities may need a few options of revenue



Long Term Operational Sustainability of Addressing the Future Growth Municipalities

issues to consider

- operational sustainability (future growth) is best addressed through access to revenues that grow with Alberta's economy. Providing municipalities with revenues that will address their long term
- The impact and costs of economic growth are absorbed by municipalities.
 Therefore revenues that grow with the economy may be most appropriate for municipalities trying to address growth issues

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
