Methodology

An online survey.

Who



n=1,010 Quebecers, 18+.

When



Completed between October 3rd and October 5th, 2025, using Leger's online panel.

Other



No margin of error can be associated with a non-probability sample (i.e. a web panel in this case). For comparative purposes, though, a probability sample of n=1,010 respondents would have a margin of error of $\pm 3.1\%$, 19 times out of 20.



Half (51%) of Quebecers believe that introducing tougher measures to stop the illegal smuggling of guns from the United States is the most effective way to reduce gun crime.

However, nearly four-in-ten (37%) say banning the sale and ownership of specific types of firearms along with a government buyback program would be the best approach to reducing gun violence.

Quebecers aged 55+ are more likely to view stricter measures on U.S. gun smuggling as the most effective way to reduce gun crime in Canada.

In contrast, younger Quebecers aged 18–34, Montreal residents, and women (40% vs. 33% of men) are more likely than their counterparts to view banning the sale and ownership of specific firearms combined with a government buyback program, as a more effective approach.
