Question one: Yes, all non-chattel assets should be disclosed for the public record no matter the country for politicians, and employees should be made to disclose privately to senior management so conflicts of interest can be dealt with more appropriately.

Question two: No, I am recommending City Council pick a councillor to work with the provincial ombudsman to establish a City of Winnipeg FIPPA policy that tells administration what is a legitimate request for information as administration has too much wiggle room in contesting a request for information/records. This policy would definitely get rid of much of the processing City FIPPA administrators spend on requests for information.

Question three: Yes I support a maximum increase in the property tax revenue to the City of Winnipeg's basket of goods and services inflation, not the general CPI. However, road renewal on the capital side needs to be taken into consideration as well. The real problem is re-assessment causing huge increases to asset wealthy cash poor residents due to housing market factors in older neighbourhoods.

Question four: no, a city is more than its roads, but in our current circumstances, a conservative consideration has to be given to requests outside our basic infrastructure needs.

Question five: No, instead of criticizing fair pensions, figure out a way to ensure nonperson plan workers have a better pension plan than just CPP.
