

Winnipeg Election Candidates Survey 2014

Below are six survey questions the Canadian Taxpayers Federation is issuing to all candidates participating in the 2014 municipal election in Winnipeg. Please provide your responses by **September 26**. Results will be posted at Taxpayer.com and distributed to our supporters.

CANDIDATE NAME: Grant Nordman, City Councillor SIGNATURE: RGN
1) Council members are currently required to disclose their ownership in businesses and property within Winnipeg. Would you support expanding disclosure for council members to include ownership of all businesses or property worldwide? (Circle one answer, space is available if you have any additional comments)
YES/NO Comment: No objection to this.
2) Would you support the creation of an informal freedom of information council committee to hear appeals from the public when the administration has refused to release city records?
YES/NO Comment: Yes, this committee could meet maybe twice a year.
3) Property taxes have been increasing faster than inflation and wage growth. Would you table or support a bylaw capping property tax increases at inflation?
YES/NO Comment: I don't know if we need a by-law but I would support targeting a cap at rate of inflation or below.
4) Roads have been neglected as millions have been spent on nice to have projects (eg. stadium, new museum, etc.) Would you support a four-year freeze on new spending for non-essential projects (eg. art gallery expansion) so that road repair becomes a priority? Road repairs should be prioritized but other projects must also be evaluated for their net
YES/NO Comment: economic impact. Some "non-essential" spending is a good investment to grow our tax base.
5) The city has been raising taxes while putting more money into its pension plans; which allow for city staff to retire in their early 50s. Meanwhile most taxpayers don't have a workplace pension. To be fair to taxpayers, would you start putting new employees in a less costly plan? This is worth considering in the context of future negotiations. Defined contribution Plans are becoming the new norm in the private sector.
6) Do you support using managed competition (having both public and private sector employees bid for existing services) and gainsharing (sharing savings with employees that bring forward cost saving ideas) to reduce costs?
Managed competition Gainsharing YES/NO Comment: We need to get the best value / results for taxpayers. Sounds like a good incentive and could reduce costs.
